

Planning to study cognitive science at Brown and painting at RISD, Layla first heard about the program from Art Teacher Brian Wildeman, RISD Class of 1991, and College Counselor Patty Kovacs.

"GIVEN MY INTERESTS in art but also my desire to continue studies outside of art, I thought that I would be good for the program and the program would be good for me," Layla explained. "For my essay, I wrote about how it's hard for me to choose between art and English or biology, and how I think that one area of study can also definitely inform and give strength to the other."

While the Midwest proved the most popular college location last year, 52 graduates will head to the East Coast this year, making it the choice destination.

Forty-seven will stay in the Midwest, 13 will attend schools on the West Coast and one will journey South. **ONLY TWO SENIORS** will leave the country, crossing the border to attend McGill University in Quebec, Canada.

All eight Ivy Leagues schools are represented in the graduates' choices.

Two Chicago schools, Northwestern University in north suburban Evanston and the University of Chicago, will garner the most U-Highers, with seven heading to each. The third most popular choice, Yale University, in New Haven, Connecticut, will gain six U-Highers.

The James Wherry-Willis Award in honor of the 1987 graduate who excellent in three sports went to Robert Meyer.

A large crowd of students, parents, administrators, faculty members and friends of the school turned out for the evening, which began with a much-praised buffet dinner catered by the Café Lab staff offering pulled pork sandwiches, turkey sandwiches, a selection of salads and pasta, desserts and a variety of fresh fruit-flavored water drinks.

Track teams made strong showings in the Independent School League Conference competition. Boys placed 3rd of 6 teams and girls 4th of 6.

Conference Champs included by event: Long jump, Julian DuBuclet; 4x400 boys' relay, Peter Zhang, Joe Turner, Robert Meyer, Ben Bucheim-Jurisson; 4x400 girls' relay, Laura Anderson, Alex Chang, Katelyn Scuhyta, Catherine Yunis.

The girls moved on to the Kenwood Sectional Meet at Hanson Stadium on Fullerton just east of Central May 13 and placed 5th, with seven Maroons qualifying for State Finals the weekend of May 20. In Sectionals, Freshman Sonia Bourdaghs and Sophomore Laura Anderson respectively finished 1st and 2nd. Sonia qualified for State in the 1600-meter run and the 4 x 800 meter team qualified by finishing 2nd; the team included Juniors Catherine Yunis, Alex Chang and Katelyn Suchtya and Sophomore Jordan Einhorn.

At State May 20 at Eastern Illinois University in downstate Charleston, Sonia finished 2nd in the 3200 run and Laura Anderson finished 2th. Sonia ran a personal best of 5:41.71 in the 1600.

Boys ran Sectionals May 20 at Hanson and finished 2nd. State qualifiers included Seniors Justin Algee, 1st in high jump; Thomas Aquino, 1st in the 300; and Robert Meyer, 1st in the 1600 run and 2ndin the 3200.

A week later at State at Eastern Illinois University in Charleston, all completed strongly with Robert nearly breaking the 1600m record held by track legend Dan McGinn, Class of 1991.

At ISL Tennis Championships May 14, Senior Tyler Anderson ended runnerup in first singles; Sophomore Lucas Buccheim-Jurisson ended 3rd in second singles; Senior Rajiv Nori and Sophomore Arnol Gundeti finished 3rd in third doubles; and Freshman James Duran and Junior Daniel Eimer finished 4th in second doubles. Sectionals followed May 20-21 at home with Tyler and Lucas proceeding to

State competition.

In Regionals May 18 at Evergreen Park and May 20 at home, soccer girls defeated St. Joseph of west suburban Westchester 4-0 to win the championship and advance to Sectionals May 25 at Riverside-Brookfield against Nazareth Academy of LaGrange.

In Regionals May 26 at Washington High School, baseball Maroons beat Washington 8-5 to win the Championship for the second time in three years. Junior Mac Sinclair pitched the entire game.

The Maroons advanced to Sectionals last Thursday against Jones College Prepthere, losing a squeaker 6-5.

raveling from B **¬**raveling from Beijing to Xi'an to Luoyang, nine students taking Chinese as a World Language will experience first-hand Chinese culture, leaving Monday, June 20 and returning Sunday, July 10. Accompanied by Chinese teachers Xinglu Liang and hour flight at Beijing Capital International Airport. Four students will stay with host families who have affiliations with Peking University while the families who have er students will live in dorms.

THE TEACHERS have planned visits to the Forbidden City, Tian'anmen Square, and the Bird's Nest, the main stadium for the 2008 Beijing Olympics. During breaks between those trips they will attend courses to help immerse them into Chinese culture such as Calligraphy, Martial Arts, and Mandarin classes.

"Chinese calligraphy is beautiful because of the technique you have to use when writing," Freshman Isabel Mitchell said. "It really caught my attention because it's traditional and would really help my writing, and I look forward to a fun experience.'

From Beijing, the students will ride a high-speed bullet train to Xi'an for a tour of the Terracotta Army Wednesday, July 6, then travel to Luoyang and visit a Shaolin temple Friday, July 9.

ARRIVING BACK in Beijing from Xi'an Saturday, July 9, the U-Highers will finish the trip shopping at Xiushui market, and receive a certificate for complet-

ing classes at the university, according to Ms. Liang. "The students will receive an honorary certificate upon completion of the courses at Peking," Ms. Liang said. "The courses will teach them Chinese history, and give firsthand experience of a Chinese student's life. When they walk around the university's campus, they will see the old architecture and old way of life."



With Midway editor-in-chief Nick Chaskin winning a first-in-nation news story award recently, two other Midway staff members have followed up with first-in-nation column writing and sports photography awards in another competition.

Editor-in-Chief Rafi Khan and Photographer Jackie Robertson (who is U-Highlights photo editor), both seniors, won 1st places in a National Federation of Press Women competition after placing 1st in an Illinois Woman's Press Association contest. They were honored along with other IWPA winners at a luncheon May 20 at the Union League Club downtown.

IN ALL, the Midway took six First Place awards and 15 total. The paper also won its third Silver Pen award for overall excellence.

Following the IWPA luncheon both Rafi and fellow Editor-in-Chief Sydney Scarlata were headed for the governor's mansion in Springfield last Saturday where the Illinois Journalism Education Association was honoring Rafi as runnerup in its High School Student Journalist of the Year program and Sydney as one of eight members of the All-State Journalism Team. Rafi also had made the National Scholastic Press Association's Honor Roll of Student Journalists.

In the IJEA's new high school competition, which succeeds a contest sponsored by the Eastern Illinois School Press Association, U-Highers won seven 1st places, including Akila Raoul, news story; Rafi, feature; Jeremy Woo, sports; Gene Cochrane, both cartoons and graphics; Sam Reynolds and Anisha Sisodia, advertisements; and Nick Phalen, front page design.

THE MIDWAY was named Best Overall Newspaper and took 1st place in Overall Design. Other winners were as follows:
